National household survey in the field in Chad

A nationally representative household survey - which will provide a new dataset on OPHI's five missing dimensions of poverty data - is currently being fielded as part of a joint project between the Government of Chad, UNICEF-Chad and OPHI. The novel survey will cover one man and every woman in the households surveyed, to study intra-household dynamics with respect to breastfeeding, handwashing, and early marriage and OPHI's missing dimensions. OPHI Research Officer, Diego Zavaleta, visited Chad in April to support the fielding of the survey, which will be analysed by OPHI researchers.
